INCREASE IN DISCRIMINATION?

With the U.S. Supreme Court granting same-sex couples the freedom to marry earlier this year, a recently released report by the <u>Movement Advancement Project</u> estimates that the majority of those couples will still face significant legal discrimination. MAP estimates that 61 percent of the lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender (LGBT) population in the United States will continue to live in states with medium or low legal protections — or that have outright hostile laws.
